

How to Quilt Any Size Quilt... Workshop - Adele Scott

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Supplies List

There are many ways to deal with the bulk of machine quilting. Learn some of the creative methods quilters have come up with to solve this problem. The right prep, products and techniques will get you quilting those larger quilts.

Most quilts can be quilted in “sections” but the method you use will depend on the quilt pattern, at what point you decide, and the materials used.

Student Supply List: Fabric "Kit" - **precut and labeled from cutting list or purchased**

Good sewing machine [must do zigzag] with all regular accessories, sewing manual

Walking foot, ¼” foot, blind hem or zipper foot

[optional – *Westalee Ruler foot & SashLee Ruler* - I’ll do a demo with this technique but unless you want to change over your machine to free-motion you might do later or use your regular sewing foot]

Neutral colored thread

Fabric Glue Pen or Stick

General sewing supplies – scissors, cutter, ruler, pins, quilters clips, fabric marker for light & dark, etc.

[optional, but recommended – *Roxanne’s “Squeezy bottle” glue*,

Any quilt patterns, pictures, or existing quilts to discuss if you’d like.

These products below will be discussed and demonstrated in class; have them available **if** you own. **You do not need to have all of these for class.** I’ll show you how to use these products and explain their value for you. These will be available to purchase, if you’re interested, after you see what they’re for and if it applies to your type of quilting.
